Penny Rug Flannel Purse By Bonnie Sullivan All Through the Night

9" x 10" approximate finished size

Penny Rug Flannel by Bonnie Sullivan for Maywood Studio

MAYWOOD STUDIO

Instructions

1. Place a piece of batting on the back side of the two A pieces, to make the front and back pieces of the purse. Quilt as desired through the flannel and batting. I stitched on both sides of the red stripe and both sides of the green vine.

2. Place the quilted step 1 pieces right sides together and pin. Using the curve template on the last page, draw the curve on the bottom two corners of the purse ¹/₄" in from the edges as shown. Using a ¹/₄" seam, sew around the sides and bottom of the purse. Trim away excess fabric in the bottom corners and turn right side out.

3. Place the two B pieces right sides together to make the lining Using the same curve template, trace the curve on the lining just as you did for the outside of the purse. Using a ¹/₄" seam, sew around the sides and bottom of the lining leaving an opening in the center of the bottom for turning as shown. Trim away excess fabric in the corners but do NOT turn right side out.

4. Slide the outside of the purse into the lining so that the right sides are together. Sew around the top of the purse $\frac{1}{2}$ " from the top edge. Turn right side out through the opening in the bottom of the lining. Sew the opening closed. Since the lining is longer than the purse, the lining should come up and over the the top edge of the purse and then tuck back down inside the purse. This will make it look like there is a binding around the top of the purse. Stitch in the ditch around the top edge of the purse where the lining meets the body of the purse.





place body of purse inside lining, right sides together, and sew around the top edge ½" down from the top

5. Piece the C pieces together to make one long strip. Press the ends of the strap in (wrong sides together) $\frac{1}{2}$ ". Press one of the long sides of the strap in $\frac{3}{8}$ " (wrong sides together). Press the other long side in about $\frac{5}{8}$ " so that the raw edges meet. Fold the edge of the $\frac{3}{8}$ " side in to the center and press. Sew up the center of the strap right along the edge last folded in and then again about $\frac{1}{8}$ " away from the first seam.



6. Sew one end of the purse strap to one side of the purse by placing the end of the strap along the inside side of the purse and sewing across the end where the lining meets the purse body. Try the purse on to determine the desired length of the strap. Sew the other end of the strap to the other side of the purse.

7. Sew on a snap for closure if you desire and you're done!

FABRIC	YARDAGE & CUTTING	*Cut WOF unless otherwise stated
	Fabric 1 F8601-J ⅓ yd	For Outside of Purse, Cut: A: Cut (1) 10" x WOF strips centering a patchwork penny motif as shown below. Cut (2) 10" x 9%" pieces out of the strips as shown below.





*If you cut carefully like this you can get 4 pieces from one strip, enough for the outsides for 2 purses.

	Fabric 2 F1813-R5 fat quarter	For Lining of Purse, Cut: B: Cut (2) 10" x 11" pieces
	Fabric 3 F8604-J ¼ yd	For Purse Strap, Cut: C: Cut (2) 2" x 27" strips
